Questions for Your Eye Surgeon

The questions worth asking at a consultation — about experience, technology, candidacy, risks, cost, and what happens if results aren't perfect.



Understand your vision-correction options with clear eyes — then get matched, free, with licensed eye surgeons near you for a consultation. You compare and choose who you trust. Nothing here is medical advice.

Experience & credentials

- Are you board-certified, and how many of these procedures have you done?
- Will you personally perform my surgery and my follow-ups?
- Who do I see if there is a problem afterward?

Candidacy & honesty

- Am I a good candidate — and would you tell me if I'm not?
- Which procedure suits my eyes, and why that one over the others?
- What results are realistic for my prescription? (No one can guarantee 20/20.)



Risks & recovery

- 1 Ask about the common side effects (dry eye, glare, halos) and how long they usually last.
- 2 Ask about the rare but serious risks for someone with my eyes.
- 3 Ask what recovery looks like day by day and when I can drive and work.
- 4 Ask what could change my result for the worse.

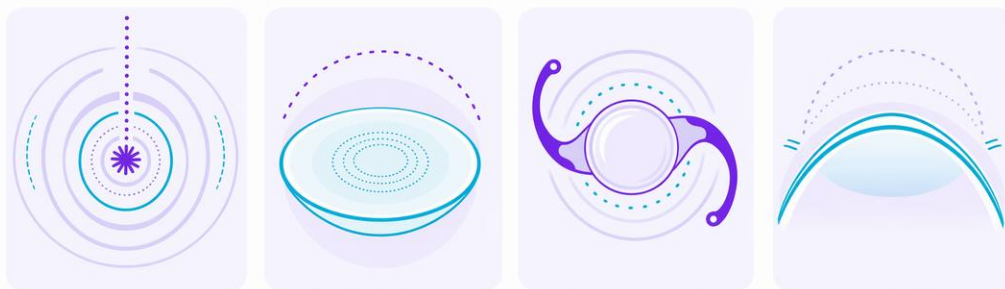
Cost & the fine print

- What is the all-in price per eye, and what exactly is included?
- Are follow-up visits and any enhancement included, or extra?
- What financing options exist, and what are the real terms?
- Is there any pressure to decide today? (There shouldn't be.)



Before you say yes

- 1 Get the full price and what's included in writing.
- 2 Take time — a good surgeon won't rush you.
- 3 Compare more than one consultation if you can.
- 4 It is always OK to wait or to keep your glasses.
